President John Rintoul opened the meeting with a request to those attending to renew their membership and to wear their name tags which were available at the entrance.

John reported that the Executive Committee met in January and detailed some of the discussion. The needs of the different Directors were discussed. The three biggest issues that "get people into trouble" are: 1) Varroa mites, 2) Queen events, and 3) Feeding. He strongly recommended reading <u>"Why did my honey bees die?"</u> by Meghan Milbrath found on the Bee Informed website. The Honey Bee Health Coalition publication is updated every quarter and is also recommended reading.
