STATE FAIR DISPLAY UPDATE

Ryan Chamberlain opened the meeting asking **Dawn Rogers**, this year's state fair display coordinator, to bring everyone up to speed on progress, needed entries, and opportunities to volunteer. Dawn and Beatrice, the beekeeper attired manikin who holds court at Bailey Bee Supply, talked about the progress being made towards preparations for the fair. She gave a quick review of rules for entries and encouraged everyone to register their entries with the club rather than entering as individuals in order to collect points towards our display. Bailey Bee Supply donated a case of honey jars which Dawn gave out at the close of the meeting to those who want to enter the honey competition.

THE NINJA WARS

Master Beekeeper **Randall Austin** was the main educational program speaker for the evening. He livened up an otherwise depressing topic, "Ninja Wars: Death by a Thousand Cuts (How Viruses Are Secretly Killing Your Bees)" and gave a humorous and yet informative presentation. He warned us that visible threats such as bears and small hive beetles get attention, while many threats are invisible and not apparent to the beekeeper until damage is done. He discussed how viruses cannot reproduce without assistance from host cells. He explained how viruses replicate and spread throughout our colonies. Transmission of viruses is often dependent on a transmission vector such as every beekeeper's perennial enemy, the varroa

mite. Randall's closing message: Beekeepers can foil viral ninja attacks by maintaining healthy hives, reducing varroa mite pressure, and in some cases requeening.

NC STATE BEEKEEPERS SUMMER MEETING

Once again, the NCSBA Summer Meeting is being held in Hickory, NC. The Hickory Metro Convention Center is an ideal venue for gatherings as large as the NCSBA Summer Meeting. NCSU trains the next generation of bee researchers

Ryan introduced Dr. David Tarpy, professor of entomology and extension apiculturist at NCSU. Dr. Tarpy introduced seven undergraduate summer research interns who are participating in the BEEMore 2019 apiculture research initiative at NC State.

NCSU's summer Research Experience for Undergraduates program offers hands-on research experience to undergraduates throughout the state. As representatives of the next generation of beekeepers they are introduced to all aspects of research and are supported by assigned mentors.
