President John Rintoul opened the meeting by encouraging the group to attend the NCSBA Summer Conference in Winston-Salem in July which will celebrate its 100th year. All that remained were 11 ratchet straps which will be sold for \$8.00 each. Several were sold at the meeting and two were raffled off. One coupon for a free Honey cookbook was also raffled off.

OCBA's presence at the Hillsborough Farmer's Market (HFM) will be tabled for this year. We applied to participate as an enterprise vendor to sell honey and educate the public about beekeeping but were never notified that our application was approved. John's multiple follow up contacts with HFM were met with no response.

Outreach Coordinator Chris Apple reported. The UNC Chapel Hill Carolina Bee Club is well underway. Chris and Geneva Green taught an overview class and will give them a 5 session mini bee course.
