Orange County Beekeepers Association Meeting Minutes

April 8, 2021 7:00 - 9:00 pm via Zoom

Carrie Donley, OCBA president, opened the meeting and welcomed everyone. She explained that the meeting would begin with an educational program followed by the business meeting. The meeting was attended by 38 people.

Carrie introduced our speaker, Dana Stahlman, whose talk was titled "What to Expect as a New Beekeeper." After retiring as a school administrator in Ohio, Dana moved to NC. He comes from a family of beekeepers and was heavily involved in the Ohio Beekeepers Association. He has raised queens, sold nucs, and at one point he managed 100 hives as a hobbyist. He currently hopes to have up to 25 colonies later this year at a site in Franklin County.

Dana had lots of advice for new beekeepers. He said it is worth the wait to get new queens when the weather is warmer because queens raised in warm weather often do better. Also, he said the best time to install a new package is around dinner time. Then the bees do not have a lot of time to fly around and decide to abscond. He said you do not need to see the queen every time you inspect a hive, but you should see eggs, larvae, and capped brood. When inspecting, Dana takes frames out from one side rather than from the center to avoid injuring the queen. He had much more advice for new (and experienced) beekeepers, including testing often for varroa mites and treating as needed. He enjoyed his experience and may continue beekeeping at some point in the future, but he is taking a break now. His bees died and his neighborhood's home6owner's association was not happy that he was keeping bees. Both of Brennan's hives made it through the winter, and he hopes to get one more hive this spring. He said the one thing that stood out for him was how different two hives can be in terms of temperament.
