Hive Chat

This month's topic of discussion was swarm traps, making splits, and when to put on honey supers - with OCBA member Brad Kosiba.

What's in Bloom: OCBA members provided photos of current blooms and bee forage plants. These included crocus, camellia, apple, hellebore, and deadnettle. Hollies are just starting to bloom, and the red maples are finishing up.

"Mental Health and Beekeeping (Is there a connection?)" - Nancy Rupert

Nancy Rupert is a retired NC Apiary Inspector (11.5 years) and was also a Licensed Nurse Practitioner (family medicine in a rural setting). She has been a beekeeper for 24 years.

Nancy talked about some of the ways beekeeping could have a positive influence on mental health:

- Promoting mindfulness (working hives makes one very in-tune with the present)
- Allows a time out from negative thoughts
- For some, beekeeping is an altruistic endeavor
- Brings you closer to nature
- Can be a distraction from your problems
- Gives your mind a positive focus

However, Nancy also noted that beekeeping can be stressful, especially if you have unrealistic expectations, or if you lack knowledge and don't have a support system.
