## **Meeting Minutes**

# April 11, 2024

Elisa Bailey, OCBA Vice-president, opened the meeting and welcomed everyone for the April meeting. There were 55 in-person attendees and 7 on zoom.

# **Hive Chat**

This month's topic of discussion was how to boost honey production - with OCBA member Lisa Vogel. Some key takeaways:

- When splitting hives, you can split for more colonies or for honey production, not both.
- Honey production requires a lot of bees, but you need to prevent them from swarming.
- Sugar water and anise oil can be sprayed on frames to draw the bees into the honey supers

# What's in Bloom

Many members submitted photos of what is currently blooming in their area: hollies, tulip poplar, painted buckeye, hellebores, blueberries, crabapple, cherries, autumn olive, dandelion, rosemary, kale and mustards, quince, and more.

# Presentations

## 2023 Youth Apprentice #3 – Mateo Aguirre

Vicki Robertson introduced the third OCBA Apprentice from 2023, Mateo Aguirre. Brad Kosiba was Mateo's mentor.

Mateo gave a great PowerPoint presentation, in which he talked extensively about his biggest challenge: keeping bees and having a neighbor with a pool. He successfully managed to encourage his bees to not use his neighbor's pool as a water source by placing multiple water sources closer to the hive, including using boardman feeders filled with water at the hive entrance.

Mateo hopes to inspire others to get into beekeeping. He currently co-teaches a class on beekeeping at his school and he's helping his cousin (in Uruguay) to study the differences in bees between North and South America.

Mentorship Director, Jose Olmeda, then presented the 3 apprentices from 2023 with their certificates.

## "Planting for Honeybees" - Mary Leonhardi

Elisa introduced fellow beekeeper, OCBA member, and Master Gardener, Mary Leonhardi. Some important considerations:

- Try for a variety of flower color, shape, and pattern. White, blue, purple, and yellow flowers are typically more attractive to pollinators than red, pink, or orange.
- In addition to planting for nectar and pollen sources, consider plants that serve as host plants for the larval development of native moths and butterflies.

- Mary's favorite plants (by season) for pollinators:
  - Spring tulip poplar, fruit trees like cherry and apple
  - Summer echinacea (purple coneflower), sunflowers, mountain mint
  - Fall goldenrod, milkweed, asters
